GETTING READY...

After the initial donor letter is mailed, our volunteers follow up with personal phone calls. They confirm with each individual and

business that an item will be contributed to the auction. It's hard work, never easy to ask for donations. Sometimes the answer is no, and that's always disappointing. But our volunteers never complain. They spend the time making these contacts because they know how important it is to gather as many items as possible so the auction will be a success.

This work usually extends over several months. When businesses agree to donate,

often it takes a trip to the store/business to collect each item. That's more time the volunteers contribute to our cause.

Our Event Coordinator keeps track of all these items,



no small task when the list begins to grow into hundreds of items!



In the midst of all these phone calls, there are planning meetings, caterer meetings, shopping trips to gather decorations, gift bags and centerpieces. Life gets a little crazy during March and April, but the

volunteers remember the reason for it all. It's those faces, the ones we see coming into our shelter every week, the faces that need so much.

This year we mailed "Save The Date" auction postcards to our loyal supporters in March. If you would like to be included on this list next year, please call the shelter, 244-6664, and we'll add

you to the list.

And the work continues. As the date gets closer, we design a placement for each table setting.

Several volunteers meet with the shelter Director and Event Coordinator to sort all the auction items. They decide if items will be combined into baskets, which items will be placed on silent auction tables, or auctioned live.

Another volunteer creates the Auction booklet, writing a description of each item up for bid.

This year, one of our volunteers has created a special tribute to the dogs and cats who have spent time at the shelter before moving on to their "forever" homes. You won't want to miss it.

As you can imagine, all the planning and advance work of the last four to five months comes together the day of the auction.

Volunteers start early, arriving at the Eagle's Nest Event Center usually before the doors are unlocked!



The final work begins with decorating the room and tables. Auction items start to arrive from various locations.

NEUTER FOR A NICKEL DAY A GREAT SUCCESS!

On Saturday, April 13, the shelter was closed to the public, but it was one of the busiest days the shelter has ever seen. How is that possible?

If you participated in our first "Neuter For A Nickel" Day, you know that we were buzzing with activity. A total of 141 male cats were brought to the shelter in the morning hours, neutered, then picked up before closing at 4:00 pm. The shelter staff, along with a small army of 47 volunteers from Whitley County and Fort Wayne, helped to make this event a huge success. "Saturday was a great day for the Humane Society of Whitley County! Everyone who volunteered wants to help end pet overpopulation. It was wonderful to work as a team toward this goal." said Laura Rowe, Animal Care Supervisor from Ft Wayne Animal Care Control.

The success of this day was due to assistance from Fort Wayne Animal Care and Control, who have held similar events in Fort Wayne over the last six years. A special thank you goes to two veterinarians who volunteered their time with us, Dr. Elizabeth (Lentz) Schaeffer and Dr. Stephanie Coats. We could not have done it without you!

A special thank you also goes to the Columbia City Street Department, Whitley County Highway Department and Breyden Products.

This event will make a real difference in the number of unwanted kitten litters born in Whitley County and the surrounding area. Controlling pet overpopulation is an important part of our shelter's mission.

FUND A NEED



New to the auction this year is "Fund A Need". It's a new opportunity to make a big contribution to the care of homeless animals who spend

For cats, it's "Bury Your Bucks" in the sand of a stainless steel litter box that will be on display at the auction. Our goal is to purchase stainless steel pans to use as litter boxes. Why stainless steel? It does not absorb bacteria as plastic litter trays do. Less bacteria means less contagious germs among the feline population and that means healthier cats. You can help achieve this goal by burying your contribution to this fund!



For dogs, it's "Get Cozy For Cash"! Leave your donation inside the large PVC pipe also on display at the auction. We hope to raise funds to purchase PVC pipe and material to



build raised dog beds so all our dog residents can sleep comfortably off the concrete floor of the shelter.

Reaching both these goals will make life for the animals in our care healthier and more comfortable.
