Did You Know?

Many cats are skittish or easily startled by sudden movements or loud noises, and fear in felines generalizes easily. According to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, this means that a cat can "experience something scary in the kitchen, like a glass crashing to the floor, and later become afraid of all linoleum flooring. Or they can go from fearing a particular object to fearing the entire room or location where the object first scared them".

If this happens to your cat, there is help available. Start by talking to your veterinarian about the problem. He/she may have suggestions on how to help your pet overcome fears.

Once a fear has been identified, owners can make changes that will help the cat be more comfortable and less fearful. Animal behaviorists have developed techniques that can help change a cat's behavior. The staff and volunteers at the Whitley County Humane Shelter can help you find these resources. Give us a call at 244-6664. It's worthwhile to help your cat overcome fears and live at peace in their environment.

Always keep human food out of your pet's reach. Even if the food itself is not a problem (but many are, including onions, chocolate, avocados and raisins), wrappers and plastic containers can be a serious health hazard. If you think your pet has ingested something that could hurt, call your veterinarian right away or the ASPCA Poison Control Center at 1-888-426-4435. The faster your pet can be helped, the better the chance for recovery.

TOP 5 REASONS TO ADOPT

If you've been thinking about adding a pet to your family, here are five reasons to adopt your new best friend from our shelter:

 You'll save a life. By adopting from a humane society, animal shelter or rescue group, you'll help save the lives of two animals, the pet you adopt and a homeless animal somewhere that can

be rescued because of space you helped free up.

- 2. You'll get a healthy pet. We examine and give vaccinations to animals when they arrive, and many are spayed or neutered before being adopted. We also screen animals for temperaments and behaviors to make sure the pet fits the adopter's lifestyle.
- 3. You'll save money. Adopting a pet from a shelter is much less expensive than buying from a pet store or through other sources. In addition, many of our animals are already spayed or neutered and vaccinated, which makes the shelter's fee a real bargain.
- 4. You'll feel better. Pets have a way of putting a smile on your face and a spring in your step. Caring for a companion animal can give a sense of purpose and fulfillment, as well as lessen feelings of loneliness and isolation in all age groups.
- 5. You won't be supporting puppy mills and pet stores. Puppy mills are "factory-style" dog breeding facilities that put profit above the welfare of dogs. Most dogs raised in puppy mills are housed in poor conditions with improper medical care. Unfortunately, a lot of people are not even aware that puppy mills exist, so when they buy from a pet store, online or other retail outlet, they are unwittingly supporting this cruel industry.

TASHA'S STORY:

If you've been lucky enough to own a cat (or several cats), you know that each one has a distinct personality. Some are outgoing and inquisitive and others are shy and quiet. The staff and volunteers at the shelter spend time getting to know each cat as an individual, believing that each one needs different levels of care and attention.

Tasha is a good example of an adult cat who is naturally quiet and reserved. She came to the shelter in late July, surrendered by her previous owner because she didn't fit in with the other members of the household (dogs, kids, lots of activity). After getting to know Tasha, we understand why this was the case. She is gorgeous, with a soft tortoiseshell coat and pretty green eyes that observe all that goes on around her.



We discovered she likes to be talked to, and will respond by vocalizing her approval. When offered a kind hand, she will lean in for scratches under her chin and strokes along her back. The more we talk and touch, the more she responds!

Unfamiliar sights and sounds startle Tasha, and her natural instinct is to withdraw.

Because of this, she often appears unfriendly.

But that's misleading.

A new tool we've just begun to use is the ASPCA's Meet Your Match cat temperament program. Tasha has participated in the program and her personality is called *'Private Investigator''*. Here's how "Meet Your Match" describes her:

"I'm working undercover to keep an eye on you and your household. You may not even know you're under surveillance. I can vanish into thin air if anyone or anything interferes with my investigation. If you need a cat who know how to stay out of trouble and will always keep your secrets, I just might take your case."

This perfectly describes the sweet girl we've come to know and love in the time she's been at the shelter!



Tasha is waiting for the right person to come see her, someone who will appreciate her outer beauty as well as her inner beauty. The right match for Tasha will understand her reserved personality and love her on her terms. She is about 1 year old, already spayed and declawed, and ready to be a quiet companion to someone special. Come in and meet Tasha and spend some time chatting. Adjusting to life with three legs hasn't changed her loving personality. She enjoys being outside and playing with toys, then curling up for a nice nap!




She's very friendly and loving and will be a great companion to someone who understands her limitations. If you can provide Jazzy with a stable home, please come in and meet her.

EXERCISING YOUR DOG:

Exercise is the most important activity you can do with your dog. Teaching your dog to walk on a loose leash next to you is so good for your dog. It teaches your dog that you are the pack leader and they are the follower. Walking your dog properly drains their energy physically as well as a mental stimulation for them. It teaches them to look to you and stay next to you as you are walking. So if you stop, turn right or left, they should be focused on you and not everything else in their environment.

You can exercise your dog in a variety of ways. Make it fun for them. I play ball with my dogs. They love to chase it and bring it back to me to throw again. As of lately, my dogs love to play Frisbee. I teach them different tricks with the Frisbee. It exercises their body as well as their mind. Agility is another fun way to exercise your dog. It teaches them to pay attention to you so they watch your body language to know how to run the course correctly. Whatever you do with your dog, make it a fun and bonding time with them.

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
